<p>1. Financial Aid for students with a Visa</p>	<p>All students still are evaluated for academic scholarships. Any admitted students can still apply to scholarships in their system. For our 3 state universities, Scholarship Universe has additional scholarships for which students can apply (all 3 state universities will be active on Scholarship Universe as of Oct 1). Here is the website: https://financialaid.arizona.edu/ScholarshipUniverse (it will be used by all universities at some point this year. Right now, Univ of AZ is the first to use this site). Prop 308 (visa type dependent) if you have lived here for at least 2 years you may qualify for in-state tuition (or less than international tuition) if you are on a qualifying visa.</p> <p>If a student is on a visa, however, they may be considered an out of state applicant that comes with higher tuition.</p>
<p>2. Where can students find additional scholarships offered though the universities?</p>	<p>Once students are admitted, students will be given a login to the university portal. From there, you can search for additional/private scholarships offered through the university. These are different than the academic scholarships that are offered to students based on their applications. <p>3. How to find scholarships for those that don't have a financial need?</p>	<p>University applicants will automatically be reviewed for academic scholarships. Students may also search for additional scholarships by using a variety of scholarship search sites. You can review some of these that are posted on the SDOHS Counseling website: https://www.dvusd.org/Page/28913</p>

	<p>For community colleges, students with a 3.25 unweighted GPA, qualify for their Presidential scholarship (tuition for 4, full-time, consecutive semesters). This requires an application. For any of the Maricopa community colleges, you can Google search the specific community college for the Presidential scholarship. Each school has their own application but the criteria is the same across all colleges in the Maricopa system. It requires an application for the specific school's Presidential Scholarship page (Google the specific school's Presidential Scholarships to find the specific school). 13. Are the same university scholarships available if a student transfers from community college to a university?

Typically, no. The academic scholarships offered are only for 1st year university freshman. Even one semester of community college will change what a student will be offered. While there can be transfer scholarships available, there are not as many and the amounts are not as large. Dual enrollment classes in high school **DO NOT disqualify** a student from being considered a university college freshman when they start attending a university the first year after high school no matter how many credits they have earned.
